STRANGE, STRANGE WORLD:
U.F.O.'s AND ENERGIES

Could the planet Earth constitute a giant magnet, attracting all the forces of the universe? Could some substances that we extract from the ground, and about which we know so little, have beneficial or harmful effects on us?

These and myriad other questions are being explored in the Strange, Strange World pavilion this year at Man and His World.

1978 marks the pavilion's tenth anniversary. To celebrate the event, we have invited a very special guest to launch the season.

He is Dr. J. Allen Hynek, an internationally-respected American astronomer. His presence will be a great honour for Man and His World.

For 20 years he was a consultant to the U.S. Air Force, with the task of finding explanations-whether natural, psychological, astro-nomic or otherwise - for the reports of sightings of unidentified flying objects. He has written books entitled "The U.F.O. Experience" and "The Hynek U.F.O. Report".

Dr. Hynek is now director of the Centre for U.F.O. studies in the United States. It is an organization devoted to promoting serious research into the U.F.O. phenomenon. U.F.O. sightings have been divided into six internationally-recognized types.

To salute Dr. Hynek's work, the Strange, Strange World Pavilion has given over a display case exclusively to U.F.O. and extraterrestrial objects.

A new "Energies" theme puts the pavilion on the trail of the latest semi-scientific discoveries in the search for explanations of bizarre happenings, whose theories have been rejected by conventional science.

A display shows the every currents circulating about the body. Another exhibit dramatizes the connection between shape and energy in inert material. The Strange, Strange World is a pavilion that shouldn't be missed.
