The World's Fair exhibits will represent the variety of mankind's cultural, scientific and economic breakthroughs. An international exhibition hall will house pavilions of foreign countries. You'll be able to sense firsthand the wonders of Japan, Australia, the People's Republic of China, Italy, the Arab Republic of Egypt, Greece, the United Kingdom, Belgium, Ireland, the Republic of Korea, France, Mexico, the Republic of Liberia, Canada, Luxembourg, the Netherlands, Denmark, Peru, the Federal Republic of Germany, and the Vatican.

And there beside the mighty Mississippi will be the enormous structure which will house the United States Pavilion. So far, 10 individual states have announced their participation, led by the host state, Louisiana, with its huge pavilion encompassing an amazing indoor waterway system.

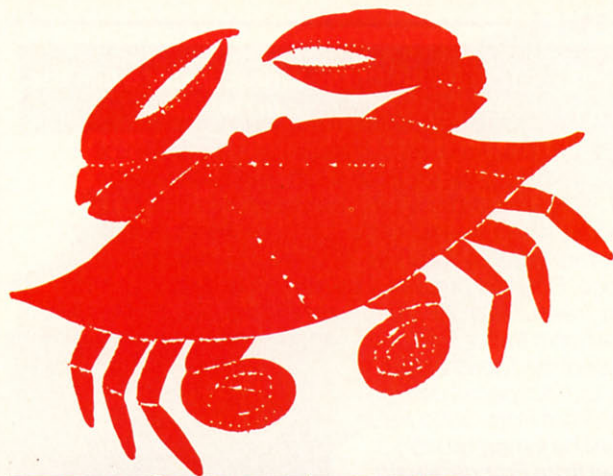


An Exciting Showcase Of American Industry.

Many of America's top corporations, including Union Pacific, the Chrysler Corporation and 17 of America's largest oil companies, will portray their technological and scientific breakthroughs at the World's Fair. The Fair plans to have industry pavilions with themes like transportation, energy, flight, high technology and more. Extraordinary displays like the space shuttle Enterprise, America's Electric Energy Exhibit and a 195-foot-high offshore oil rig will capture your imagination. And don't miss the spectacular view from the gondola cars of MART (Mississippi Aerial River Transit) as you ride 36 stories high above the mighty Mississippi River.

A World Of Entertainment.

Over 50,000 hours of entertainment are being designed for Fairgoers of all ages. There'll be a fabulous spectrum of live music, dance and drama performed on 22 stages. International stars, including the London Philharmonic; Bob Hope; The Oak Ridge Boys; Air Supply; Johnny Cash; Dionne Warwick; Ray Charles; Henry Mancini; Willie Nelson; Sammy Davis, Jr.; Roy Clark; Count Basie; George Burns and Tom Jones, will be performing at the Quality Seal Amphitheatre. There'll be New Orleans and international jazz performed in the Jazz and Gospel Tent and toe-tapping Cajun music at the Louisiana Folklife Festival. Pete Fountain's Reunion Hall will feature great Louisiana cuisine and all types of music in the atmosphere of a turn-of-the-century New Orleans dance hall. There'll be authentic Bavarian food and music at the 1600-seat German Beer Garden. You'll be able to sample delicious pastas and experience the excitement of the Flag Throwers of Sansepolcro as you stroll through the Italian Village. And not since the 1939 World's Fair has there been anything like our Aquacade, a lavish, beautifully synchronized aquatic extravaganza.



Getting Hungry Is Something To Look Forward To At This World's Fair.

New Orleans is as famous for great cuisine as it is for great music. The French, Spanish, Italian and other cultures and cuisines blend in Louisiana to bring forth unique delicacies.

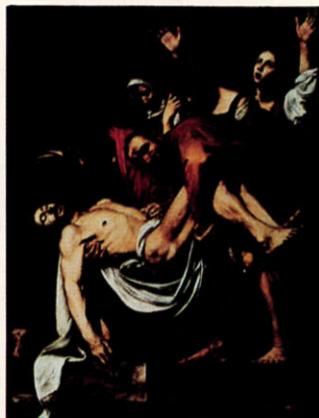

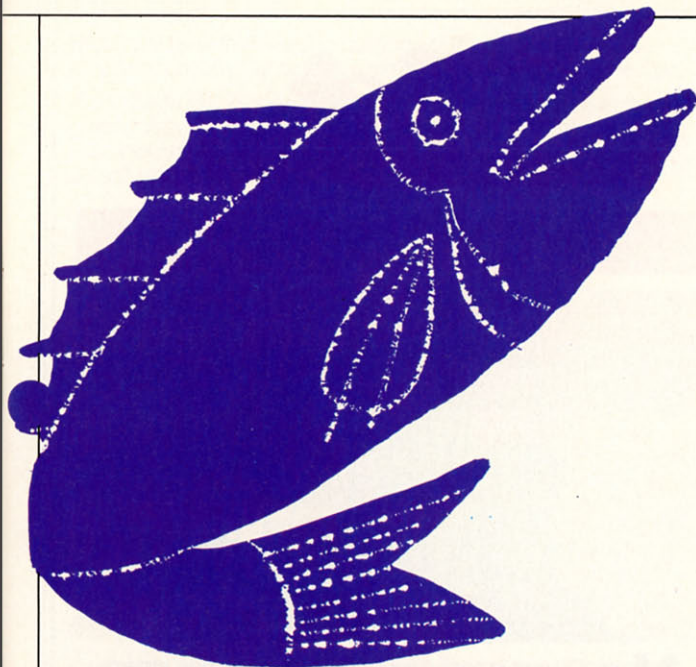


See The Art Treasures Of The Vatican Inside While The Saints Go Marching In Outside.

The Treasures of the Vatican is a special exhibit within the New Orleans Vatican Pavilion at the 1984 World's Fair. It contains art treasures from the Vatican Museums and other collections, featuring masterpieces by Raphael, El Greco, Caravaggio, Giotto, Rousult, Matisse, Dali and de la Tour. The Treasures of the Vatican exhibit will feature 34 works of art from the Vatican Museums. These works, loaned by special permission from Pope John Paul II, will be joined by works of art from France, Spain, Italy, England, Ireland, Canada, Germany and Africa to ensure that this will be one of the most spectacular and memorable exhibits at the 1984 World's Fair. It will be a rewarding experience for people of all faiths and all who love fine art.

**The World Of Rivers—
Fresh Water As A Source Of Life.**

This is the theme of the 1984 World's Fair. The United Nations has designated the 1980's as the decade dedicated to the problems and opportunities involved with providing sufficient fresh water for people of all nations. The Fair will spotlight the rivers and ports of Louisiana and the world in a variety of spectacular exhibits, demonstrations, fountains, sculpture and wondrous aquatic performances. An intricate network of lagoons, streams and aqueducts will wind throughout the Fair. The site of the World's Fair is along the bank of America's mightiest river—in New Orleans, the second largest port in the world.





Easy Ways To Get To The World's Fair.



New Orleans is easily accessible by air, rail, bus, steamboat and automobile. The City is served by a modern intrastate and interstate highway system. The New Orleans Airport provides 5,000 flights each month, including nonstop connections to Europe and Central and South America, by 21 domestic and international carriers. New Orleans is also accessible by excellent bus and train transportation and by cruise ships from many countries. The site of the 1984 World's Fair is along the Mississippi River within walking distance of both the downtown business district and the French Quarter.



The Great Celebration Begins May 12.

The World's Fair will operate for 184 days. It opens on May 12 and continues until November 11, 1984. The gates open daily at 10:00 a.m. Pavilions close at 10:00 p.m.; the Fulton Street entertainment area will remain open until 2:00 a.m.



There's Never Been A World's Fair With So Many Hotels Within Walking Distance.

By opening day, the New Orleans metropolitan area will boast more than 25,000 first-class hotel and motel rooms, over half of

which will be within walking distance of the Fair's front gates. Ample hospitality will be available for visitors coming to the Fair.

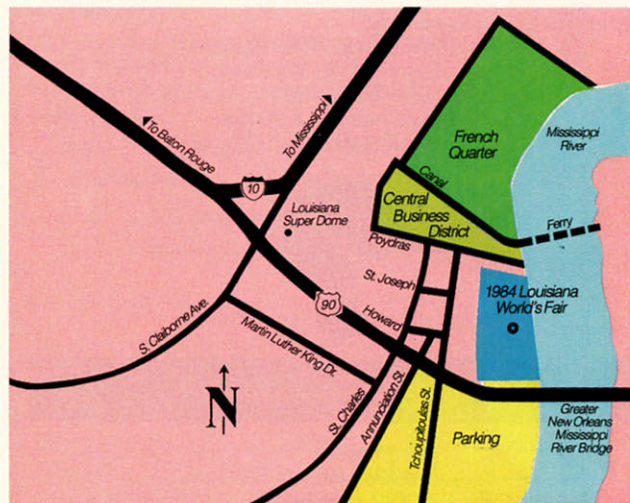


A World's Fair That Is Air-Conditioned.

New Orleans enjoys semitropical weather year round. The site, right on the Mississippi River, is cooled by a steady breeze, lessening the effects of the summer temperatures. What's more, a majority of the Fair site is air-conditioned and covered for your comfort. Even our 1.4-mile monorail will loop you around the site in air-conditioned comfort. We've also designed the Fair site to take advantage of the magnificent trees and flowers native to Louisiana. Stately palm trees will shade you, fountains will mist you and many rest oases will invite you to sit and relax.



Ample Parking Available.



The majority of Fair parking will be at the principal parking facility at the Bridge Gate of the Fair site. This 68-acre lot is directly adjacent to the Fair site and will accommodate well over 7,000 private vehicles. Additionally, peripheral facilities will be available and will be serviced by shuttle buses. There will also be terminal

facilities for motorcoaches and shuttle buses. The City Gate will service pedestrian traffic coming from the French Quarter and the Central Business District. Information on parking and traffic conditions will be available on local radio stations.



The World's Fair Is Accessible To The Handicapped.

The Fair has assured the mobility of the physically disabled by designing sidewalks, curb ramps/cuts, crosswalks, signage and street furniture to provide for free and safe movement as well as safety and accessibility for handicapped visitors. All Federal, state and local laws are being complied with.

Adequate handicapped parking spaces and a drop-off zone are available at major entrances to the Fair site.

There's not a curve for 24 miles. The Causeway's own police force patrols regularly, strictly enforcing speed laws to ensure your safety. For emergency assistance, the Expressway Commission has installed motorist call boxes every half-mile on both spans. When you depress the lever, the call is received at headquarters and help is on the way.

Check your map...east, west, north or south. All major routes lead to the Lake Pontchartrain Causeway — the most picturesque route to New Orleans. When you plan your World Fair itinerary or any trip to New Orleans, for business or pleasure, plan to cross the Causeway Bridge. You'll get scenery, safety and the best New Orleans' skyline views. The Causeway links the two shores and lets residents and visitors easily enjoy both the city and the country without transportation hassles.

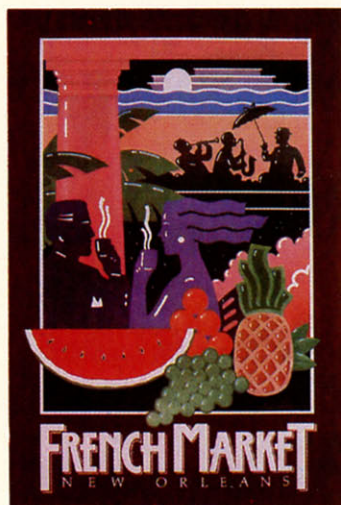

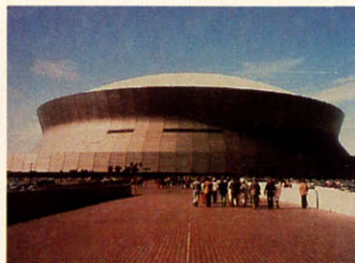

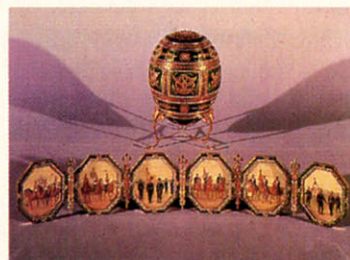

NEW ORLEANS MUSEUM OF ART In 1911 Isaac Delgado, a sugar factor and philanthropist, gave funds to the City of New Orleans to build a museum in his honor. The original neo-classic building, located in City Park, was

designed by Chicago architect Samuel Marx. It was named the New Orleans Museum of Art in 1971, after the addition of three new wings.

The Museum's collection includes the arts of Western civilization, Africa, the Far East and pre-Columbian America. In 1983 an outstanding assemblage of late 18th-early 19th century American



furniture was added, consisting of a Louisiana Bedchamber and a Federal Drawing Room. Also in 1983, the Museum opened the *Treasures of Peter Carl Faberge*. This exhibition of 58 objects, many of which once belonged to the Russian Royal Family, includes the Imperial Easter Eggs of 1893, 1895, and 1912.



The Museum has presented major international exhibitions such as the *Treasures of Tutankhamun* and *The Search for Alexander*. Special exhibitions scheduled on a rotating basis in 1984 include *Leonardo da Vinci's Codex Hammer*; *Masterpieces of the American West*; *Circles of the World: Traditional Art of the Plains Indians*; and *Art of the Cameroon Grasslands*.
