CITY URGED TO KEEP BUILDINGS AT FAIR

A proposal to preserve some of the industrial buildings at the World's Fair will be offered to the City Council this week.

Councilman Joseph F. Ruggieri, Democrat of Brooklyn, will introduce a bill to set up a temporary commission to study the feasibility of purchasing World's Fair facilities for permanent convention, recreational and educational facilities.

Mr. Ruggieri said that buildings that cost millions of dollars to erect were "not shells" and would last 10 to 20 years.

Retention of buildings other than the heliport, the Hall of Science and the New York City building that was part of the 1939-40 World's Fair is not on the plan advanced by Robert Moses, president of the fair.

He wants to clear the fair site for park purposes and to build a zoo on nearby park land. A bill that would authorize the city to extend the lease of the fair site to 1967 was prepared under Mr. Moses' direction.
