

New Job Center For World's Fair Will Open Today

A state employment center that will help fill some of the 15,000 jobs that are expected to be available at the World's Fair over the next six months was dedicated yesterday.

Officials of the State Employment Service were hosts to 50 representatives of labor unions, corporations and fair exhibitors in the new World's Fair Placement Center at 48-09 108th Street, Corona, Queens, two blocks from the fairgrounds.

Milton Speiser, manager of the center, which will be open for business today, said there were "lots of jobs right now" for guides, hostesses, guards, ticket sellers, maintenance men, waitresses and busboys.

About 35,000 employes will be needed to serve the 70 million visitors expected to attend the fair.

Alfred L. Green, executive director of the State Division of Employment, said he expected "a considerable turnover" of fair personnel and hoped "employers would turn to us." Many of the exhibitors have already done extensive hiring and are now training their personnel.

Four companies are doing the bulk of the hiring. They are Greyhound at the World's Fair Inc., the Brass Rail Restaurants, the Allied Maintenance Company and Pinkerton's National Detective Agency.
