It's an exciting, gay kaleidoscope by day. After dark, it is transformed into an enchantment of rainbow-hued lights and fountains. Sightseeing flights go on up to 11 pm.

So don't miss the helicopter ride. Long before you touch down again, you'll know why everyone says "You haven't seen the Fair, if you haven't seen it from the air."

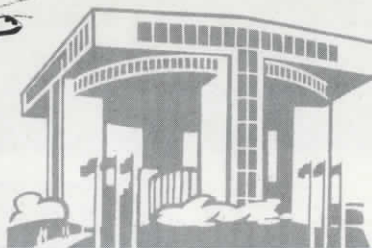
Take your own aerial photos—Here's your opportunity to make spectacular aerial photos or movies, that you'll show with pleasure for years to come. Low altitude flights assure good results with any camera.



HELICOPTER SIGHTSEEING FLIGHTS leave the Heliport every few minutes, circling the Fair on a double-loop route at about 500 feet. The adult fare is \$6.50, \$3.50 for children. You can save time by getting tickets in advance, from your travel agent or New York Airways. Or you can buy tickets at the Heliport Building. Credit cards are accepted.

HELICOPTER SERVICE TO THE FAIR: frequent flights daily from the TWA Flight Center at Kennedy International Airport to the World's Fair Heliport. Fare \$6 one way, half fare for children. Also connecting service from Newark Airport to the Fair via Kennedy Int'l, \$12 one way.

N.Y. PORT AUTHORITY HELIPORT BUILDING, in the Transportation Section of the Fair, is a major attraction in itself. You'll find aeronautical exhibits at ground level, and a restaurant and cocktail lounge high up under the roof. On the roof-deck, 120 feet up and 30,000 square feet in area, is the official U.S. designated Heliport.

SIKORSKY S-61N

THE WORLD'S LATEST AND LARGEST
PASSENGER HELICOPTER

Almost everything on show at the Fair is the best, the most modern, of its kind. That's certainly true of the S-61N. It's the finest passenger helicopter ever to bear the name Sikorsky. Helicopters of the S-61 series are powered by twin General Electric turbine engines. Top speed is about 150 m.p.h., and the climb rate is 1,300 feet per minute. Military versions are in service throughout the world. Six airlines use the S-61 for scheduled service in the U.S.A., Britain, Pakistan, Japan and Australia.

The helicopter takes you on a figure-8 ride. You'll see the location of all major exhibits and, in the distance, Manhattan's skyscrapers, Long Island Sound and New York harbor.

The S-61N is a full-size transport aircraft, yet the 5-bladed rotor, 62 ft. in diameter, lifts it like a feather. The boat-like hull permits alighting on water. The roomy cabin provides airliner comfort. Make your own aerial photos of the Fair.
