


THE TRAVELERS at the New York WORLD'S FAIR


The Travelers exhibit is housed in a unique building—one that is patterned after its familiar symbol of insurance protection . . . the red umbrella.


DAWN OF MAN

THE FIRST CITY




CIVILIZATION IN PERIL

A Few Of The Other Exhibits At The Fair




TRANSPORTATION & TRAVEL—A full city block in size, the exhibit will tell the story of people and products on the move. Two of the highlights will be the Transportation Hall of Fame and a Man on the Moon show.



CIRCUS—John Ringling North will present a continental circus complete with clowns, floats, animals and feats of daring. It will take place in a one-ring, 4,000 seat air-conditioned arena.



HELIPORT—The Port of New York Authority building will include a 120 foot heliport. Inside will be the Fair's own 1,000 seat restaurant and a bar serving drinks from around the world.



FEDERAL PAVILION—The pavilion, whose theme will be "Challenges to Greatness," will show our country's opportunities, problems and inspirations.



HAWAII—The Aloha State will be but one of the many states and countries represented. Part of Hawaii's outstanding pavilion will include a sumptuous volcano restaurant, complete with intermittent eruptions.



HONG KONG PAVILION—This charming blend of modern and traditional Chinese architecture will feature upswept eaves, bright colors and intricate carvings. The entrance will be through a 45 foot gateway which leads to the crescent-shaped Bridge of the Rainbow.
