The Boy Scouts will be unofficial *ambassadors for the youth* of the world, greeting international visitors and becoming a part of the various ceremonies welcoming young and old alike."

LOCATION

"The Wonderful World of Scouting" is located near the Rodman Gate No. 7. It fronts on the Avenue of Progress and is on the primary bus route and about midway between the Bell System and Better Living pavilions.

FEATURES

The Scouting pavilion includes 1½ acres of colorful displays and action demonstrations showing the purpose and scope of Scouting. A lively show of Scouting skills is put on by visiting Cub Scouts, Boy Scouts, Explorers, and Scout Service Corps members. It is also a world friendship center.

REQUIREMENT FOR SERVICE

Leaders must be 21 years of age and over; Scouts, 14-18 years of age.
Fee for 1-week participation is \$30 from April 20-October 18, 1965.

At intervals the council ring arena becomes a lively show of Scouting skills.

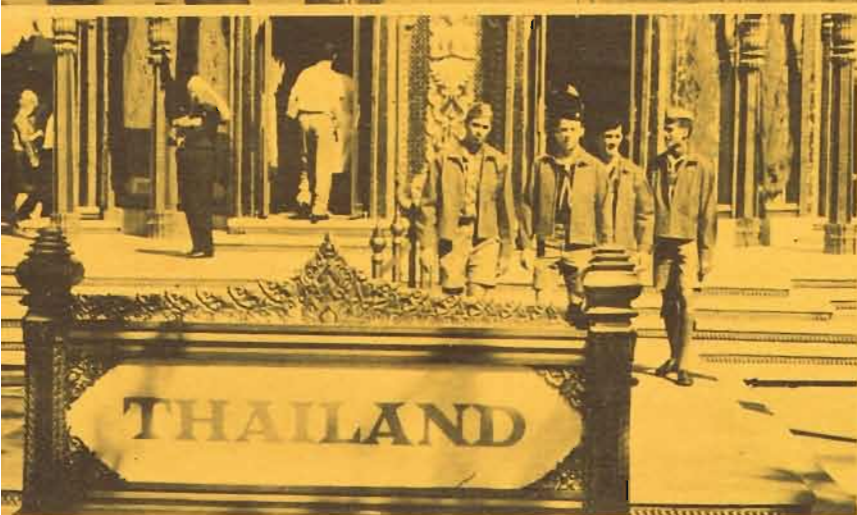
Indian dancing, backwoods engineering, signaling specialties, and other unusual skills are demonstrated.

Chapel services are available.



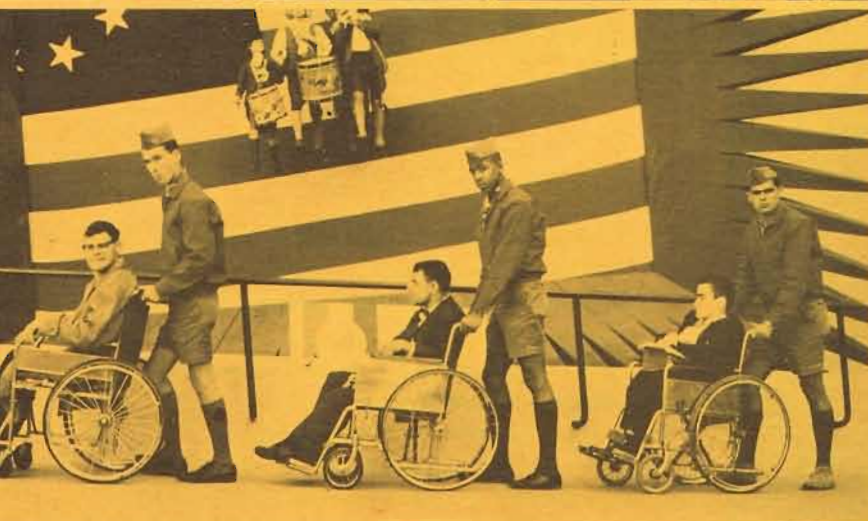
