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THE COUNTRY STORE

A visit to the Country Store, an authentic replica of a picturesque Yankee tradition, is a nostalgic journey back through New England's unique early days.

Appropriately situated next to the Village Green in the New England States Pavilion, the rustic Country Store symbolizes the unique characteristics in the New England personality, both past and present.

The New England Pavilion and the Country Store offer friendly contrast to the ultra-modern displays elsewhere in the Fair. The Store gives insight into the Yankee heritage, while the other displays are evidence of the dynamic Space Age progress which that heritage has nurtured.

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A glance over the shelves lined with handcrafted products will give the visitor the feeling of the friendship, ingenuity and hard work which guided the founding and growth of a nation.

The Boston Traveler summed up the Country Store this way: "A diamond in a mile of glass beads."

The Store is managed by the The Dunfey Family Hotels and Motor Inns of New Hampshire and Maine, operators of the Carpenter Motor Hotel and Wayfarer Motor Inn, Manchester, N. H.; Lamie's Tavern and Motor Inn, Hampton, N. H., and the Eastland Motor Hotel, Portland, Maine.

The New England Council World's Fair Corporation selected the Dunfey Family to operate the Country Store because of their reputation for New England hospitality and ingenuity.

The Dunfeys have had wide experience with country stores at two of their motor inns. The Flax Wheel Shop at Lamie's Tavern and Motor Inn and John Goffe's General Store at the Wayfarer Motor Inn are extremely successful.

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To insure complete authenticity, The Dunfeys enlisted the skills of Mrs. Feralyn Watson, of Sturbridge, Mass., in planning every detail of the Country Store. Mrs. Watson was on the original staff for the world famous Old Sturbridge Village restoration in Massachusetts and managed the Country Store there. She also serves as manager of the Flax Wheel Shop and John Goffe's General Store for the Dunfey Family.

Among traditional New England products featured at the Country Store are antique lighting devices, including tin lanterns, bayberry and tallow candles, table linens, pewter products, cheddar cheeses, maple sugar, brick oven baked beans and even licorice sticks and gum drops.

A minimum of 1-million visitors are expected to browse through the Country Store, and it is the wish of the Dunfey Family that they leave the Store with a better understanding of America's early years and of New England as it was and as it is today.

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
