

Orchids to all the fine voices heard daily over our newly installed audience-control speakers in the garden area. It adds so much when



### NOTES ON WORLD'S FAIRS

The Unisphere, the largest globular structure ever built by man, will remain after the Fair is gone, and it will join a host of other mementos of At The Small World previous world's fairs which dot the world. Among them are the Jefferson Memorial (1904 Louisana Purchase Exposition, St. Louis); Midway Plaisance (Colubian Expo. of 1893, Chicago); Municipal Stadium (1926 Sesqui-Centennial Expo., Phila.); Eiffel Tower (1889, Paris World's Fair); Treasure Island (Golden Gate International Expo. of 1939, 'Frisco); Monument to the Molecule (Brussels Fair, 1958); Seattle Space Needle (1960 World's Fair), and many others. The only remmant of the 1915 World's Fair in San Francisco, the decaying Palace of Fine Arts, is going to be refurbished. It'll cost the city and the state an estimated \$8 million and, when completed, it will become a unit of the California State Park System. With all those fairs so close to one-another, you'd think that no one would even be thinking about the next one, - and, yet, they ARE: In next week's issue we'll delve into some of the many world's fairs on the horizon. Somehow, they all appear to be in the United States. They'll cover the country from Boston, Massachusetts to Long Beach, California, and one is already endorsed by the Bureau of International Expositions. The battle is on. We'll fill you in on the details next week, by jiminy!
