The World's Fair Pavilion of Fine Arts (50¢) is located in the International Area in the building originally designed as the Pavilion of Argentina, next door to Mexico and across the street from Korea. The pavilion also houses a restaurant and cocktail lounge.

AFRICAN PAVILION WOWS 'EM AND UPS PRICE

The Pavilion of Africa, at a time when other shows are crying about the lack of box-office receipts, has actually boosted its admission prices. Originally, it cost adults \$1.00 and children 50¢ to gain entrance. This remains the same on weekdays, but on Friday, Saturday and Sunday the tab is \$1.50 for adults and 75¢ for children. Playing to between 10 and 12,000 guests on weekends, the pavilion offers a museum, exhibits, zoo-menagerie and a compound stage featuring Gold Coast and Watusi (Burundi) dance groups. The stage is also visible from the quaint treehouse restaurant tables.


"SMALL WORLD" OPERATING HOURS
