NEWS AROUND THE FAIRGROUNDS

It appears that the State of Florida will really be drawing Fair visitors this season with their new policy of "no admission." Governor Haydon Burns has stated that his state will offer a free porpoise show (admission was \$2 last year), free Seminole Indian Village with alligator wrestling and a free water ski show at the Amphitheatre. Tommy Bartlett of Silver Springs will produce the aqua production.

The 24,000 square foot geodesic dome called the World's Fair Pavilion (just up the Avenue of Commerce from our Pepsi-Cola Pavilion) will be converted to house an exhibit called "People-to-People Presents a Tribute to Winston Churchill." The Churchill family has approved and will provide many objects associated with the former statesman. There will be a continuous film in an 800-seat auditorium. Admission charges of 50¢ for adults and 25¢ for children will help set up an "international educational institution."

LAVISH NEW JONES BEACH SHOW

Again this year, the Jones Beach Marine Theatre and the Lincoln Center of Performing Arts will tie in with the World's Fair. Lincoln Center's program will be announced at a later date. However, the Marine Theatre has already announced its new production - Guy Lombardo's "Mardi Gras" - said to outdo last season's "Around The World In 80 Days" (if it's possible to produce anything more spectacular). If you missed the show last year, check with those who saw it and then be sure to mark it in your date book as a MUST item on your summer agenda. This is one of the world's most unique theatres and their productions include such things as trick scenery, elephants, entire ships (there's a river in front of the stage), full-size trains - just about anything and everything you can think of.
