<u>Exhibit</u>: The Canadian Pavilion is organized into six areas. The Introductory Theatre, the Theme Theatre, the Underwater Sound & Light Show, Fitness Arcade, Leisure by the Seasons - 'Reflections of Canada' and the Canadian Province of British Columbia's own 'Adventures British Columbia' (ABC) Theatre.

The Introductory Theatre shows a 24-projector audio-visual presentation entitled "This is Our Home" which features 1000 vibrant images of a country in celebration (10 minutes).

The Theme Theatre presents 'Canada', a multi-screen presentation (five synchronised 35mm film projectors) showing Canada's landscape, seasons and people in a panoramic but humorous treatment (15 minutes).

The spectacular Underwater Sound and Light show features some of the world's most advanced underwater technology in a simulated deep sea environment.

The Fitness Arcade is an interactive exhibit featuring equipment developed by the Ontario Science Centre in Toronto. Visitors are encouraged to test their balance, fitness, strength and reflexes in a variety of creative, fun and informative ways.

'Reflections of Canada' recreates the seasons using sound, lighting and mirrors to feature a range of Canadian leisure equipment from snowmobiles to lazer sailboats.

British Columbia is participating in World Expo 88 within the Canada Pavilion with its 'Adventures British Columbia' (ABC) Theatre. The ABC Theatre is actually a room sized computer in which the audience participates in a video-arcade-style adventure game to discover just how adventurous they are. With the aid of a panoramic screen, video monitors, special light and sound effects, the computer ABC and his assistants, 'MC' the robot and 'Feedback', the voice synthesizer, the audience is launched into a BC adventure.

Entertainment: For the queueing visitors, the Canada Pavilion is providing daily entertainment on an outdoor stage. The backdrop for this stage is a 10 metre high 'Thunderbird' of West Coast Indian legend.

Over 200 Canadian entertainers will appear during World Expo 88.

During Canada Week, nightly gala concerts by top Canadian performers, including internationally renowned performers are scheduled. Street entertainment includes jugglers, mime artists and clowns. Other Canadian entertainment, such as the Royal Mounted Police Band feature at World Expo 88 entertainment venues. Special events such as theme weeks and trade promotion activities are also scheduled throughout.

## CANOPIES

World Expo 88's eight giant "sun sails" form one of the largest and most sophisticated tension membrane series in the world.

The canopies are designed to shade and protect Expo visitors and provide a spectacular land mark. They will also be used as canvasses for special effects laser light shows.

Europe's leading expert in tension membrane technology, German engineer, Mr Harald Muehlberger, designed the eight canopies.

The canopies were tensioned by a system of galvenised steel cables. Rock anchors and concrete piles up to 24 metres deep were used to secure the cables to the ground.

Seven of the canopies were raised in August 1986. The eighth canopy was raised in February 1988.

They cover a total area of 35,000 square metres - the equivalent of seven rugby fields.

About 50,000 square metres of PVC coated polyester fabric and more than 10 kilometres of steel cable was used.

## CAPERS

Capers, the Computer Assisted Performers and Events Rostering System, provides entertainment information by date, venue and type of entertainment.

The system, devised for the Entertainment Division, registers possible performers. It then goes on to record the booking of acts, and schedules their performances across all venues on site.

It also records the support required for contracted performers, including performance requirements, transport facilities necessary, accommodation and travel arrangements.

### CAPTAIN COOK NAVIGATOR

The National Maritime Museum in Greenwich, London, is the largest maritime museum in the world, and it has lent its entire collection of Cook material for a specially created exhibition "Captain James Cook, Navigator". Many of the exhibits have not previously been seen outside Britain including the original plans of the Endeavour, paintings by Hodges, official artist on the second voyage and the astronomical instruments used to observe the transit of Venus at Tahiti.

A series of specially created settings provide an evocative background to Cook's life as a seaman and navigator. Rare vellum charts and early globes show the world before Cook. Featured are the hand-drawn charts which made Cook' reputation, and paintings by Gainsborough and Dance of his patrons and friends.

Part of the dockyard at Deptford is recreated as a setting for the fitting out of the Whitby collier which was converted for the expedition to the South Seas. The centre-piece here will be the finest and most accurate model ever made of the Endeavour showing all her stores and every member of her crew.

A star exhibit is the chronometer by Kendall which went around the world with Cook and was so accurate that it solved the age old problem of finding longitude at sea. There is also Cook's own sextant, and the telescope, barometer and charts which he took with him.

The highlights of the exhibition include the magnificent series of paintings by William Hodges. Of Australian interest are the charts of Botany Bay and Endeavour River which were drawn by seaman on the Endeavour. The exhibition also includes the recently discovered portrait of Cook by Hodges, as well as the most famous of all the images of the great seaman by Nathanial Dance.

ABC has lent costumes from a recent television mini-series and these will be used to introduce the story of the greatest explorer of the Pacific Ocean.

#### CENTRAL HOUSE - ALLGAS BUILDING:

The century-old building, which served as a bank office in the early 1900s, will become the Westpac headquarters at Expo. A Spanish restaurant will also be located in the three-storey building. It has been renamed from the Allgas Building to Central House because of its location on the Expo site.

Full Westpac banking facilities are at Central House including a Bureau de Change for all foreign currencies.

Central House is one of four historic buildings located on the Expo site.

The building, situated in the heart of the Expo site, was constructed in 1885 and was originally occupied by the drapery firm, Allen and Stark.

By the 1890's the Queensland National Bank (later to be incorporated into National Bank of Australasia Limited) was leasing a section of the building as a branch office. When Allen and Stark moved to a city building the South Brisbane Gas and Light Co. Ltd moved in. The company was later known as Allgas Energy Ltd.

The bank eventually bought the building in 1909 and kept an office open until 1943. From the 1930's Allgas gradually built up its leased area and in 1942 the building was extended with an annexe attached to the south-eastern side.

In 1965 the bank sold the building to Allgas, which carried out major restructing to the interior. Allgas remained in the building until 1985.

#### CEREMONIAL EVENTS

Ceremonies at World Expo 88 will focus on the communications between peoples of the world in ways that are formal and ritualistic, as well as spectacular and uplifting. At World Expo 88 there will be a number of ceremonies including:

OPENING DAY CEREMONY: April 30, 1988. Her Majesty, Queen Elizabeth will officially open World Expo 88. Also in attendance will be the Duke of Edinburgh.

CLOSING DAY CEREMONY: October 30, 1988

NATIONAL DAYS: In keeping with the tradition of world expositions, World Expo 88 has designated National Days to honour the participating nations.

SPECIAL DAYS: International organisations, provinces, states, corporations and Australian communities are encouraged to stage Special Days.

Exhibits: The China Pavilion features reproductions of terracotta warriors and bronze carriages unearthed near the tomb of Emperor Qin Shihuang (221-206 BC), genuine bricks from the Great Wall of China and Chinese arts and crafts. Eight folk artists work on jade and stone, embroidery and rice paper painting. On display is stone carvings, Chinese musical instruments, antique weapons, jewellery, lacquerwear, Tan tri-colour glazed pottery (618-907 AD), porcelain and cloisonne reflecting both China's ancient civilizations and the modern age.

A circle vision film of colourful folk customs and Chinese scenery is shown. The film runs for 20 minutes and is shown 12 times daily.

## COLLINS PLACE - SPAGHETTI HOUSE

This elegant stone mansion, built in 1889, has been transformed into an Italian pasta house.

Collins Place, built as a private residence, was restored in 1983-84 as business premises. It was completely refurbished to the extent of pouring cast iron to match the original balustrading where missing.

Collins Place is located at the southern end of the Expo site next to the Nepalese Pagoda.

## COMET EXPRESS (TNT)

#### COMMISSIONER GENERAL

In accordance with the Bureau of International Expositions (B.I.E.) rules, World Expo 88 is hosted by the Australian government.

The Honourable Sir Edward Williams is the Commissioner-General of World Expo 88, appointed by the Commonwealth Government.

The role of a Commissioner-General is to initiate discussions with foreign countries on participation in World Expo 88. He also attends Authority meetings as an observer on behalf of the Commonwealth.

Before being appointed to this position in March 1984, Sir Edward served as a Justice of the Queensland Supreme Court from 1971 to 1984. He was also Chairman of the Queensland Parole Board from 1976 to 1983.

Sir Edward was knighted in 1981 for services to law and to the community. In 1982, he received the Australian of the Year Award, following his work as Chairman of the X11 Commonwealth Games Foundation. In 1983, he received a higher honour when he was made a Knight Commander of the Order of St Michael and St George (KBE) in recognition of his service to sport, particularly the X11 Commonwealth Games.

<u>Exhibit</u>: The idea for a Community Pavilion on the World Expo 88 site arose from a desire to involve and give promotion to the communities closest to World Expo 88 ie: the Queensland and Northern New South Wales regions.

Because World Expo 88 encouraged a broad cross-section of each community to be involved, the Community Committees comprised of people involved not only in the Tourism Authorities, but in the Chambers of Commerce and various service groups. For convenience, each Committee was organised according to Tourism regions, amounting to some 20 Community Committees being formed. Representatives of World Expo 88 (including the Chairman, Sir Llewellyn Edwards) visited each region and representatives from each Community, in turn, were brought to Brisbane for complete briefings about World Expo 88 and the Community Pavilion idea.

Regions involved in the pavilion are:
Lismore/Holiday Coast, Greater Brisbane, Gold Coast/Albert Shire,
Sunshine Coast, Toowoomba and the Golden West, Bundaberg,
Rockhampton (Capricorn), Mackay, Whitsundays, Townsville,
Cairns/Far North, Gulf Savannah, North West Queensland and
Outback.

Each community is represented in this pavilion. Additionally, each community has been allotted a nine-day 'high-profile period' in which to promote their area through displays and entertainment ranging from sheep-shearing demonstrations to bush bands.

The pavilion is manned by volunteers from each region and the project is overseen by the World Expo 88 Authority.

Fund-raising for each community took many forms. Each community also agreed to promote World Expo 88 and encourage ticket sales during their fund-raising events. World Expo 88 provided media support and in most cases, each region also enlisted the help of their local media to promote the Community Pavilion concept.

Other features: The Community Committees pavilion is located in a building shared by Hungary and Cyprus, Suncorp Building Society and the Japanese Technoplaza.

# WORLD EXPO 88 ESSAY-WRITING COMPETITION

This competition, which ran from July to October 1987, was for Queensland school students from Years 5 to 12 (ie: ages 9 to 18). It was run by World Expo 88 with the endorsement and assistance of the Queensland Education Department, the Catholic Education Office and the Independent Schools Association.

The objectives of the competition were to create awareness among Queensland students of World Expo 88, its educational potential and its benefits to Australia. As such, the competition was split into two sections, one for primary age students and one for secondary students. The title of the primary essays was "Why I Want to Visit World Expo 88" and for secondary essays "World Expo 88: What It Means to Australia".

The difficult task of judging was overcome by asking school teachers to choose the single best essay from their classes and give these to the school principal for year level judging. The school principal then forwarded the best essay from each year level to World Expo 88 (ie: maximum of three essays from primary schools; five essays from secondary schools; six essays from high-top schools). In this way, only 350 essays were actually received by World Expo 88. A panel of volunteer teachers from Brisbane schools, which had been made Honorary Ambassadors for World Expo 88, then judged the essays during a number of marathon sessions.

A winner and two runners-up from each year level were chosen. Each winner received a 3-Day ticket to World Expo 88 and each runner-up had the choice of a family VIP tour of any ten pavilions of their choice or a day ticket to the space-age rides in World Expo Park (valued at approximately \$20). All runners-up, without exception, chose the family VIP tour prize which enabled their family to gain 'Instant Access' to the pavilions, eliminating queueing.

The winning students from schools in the Brisbane area were personally presented with their prizes at school assemblies. Winners from country areas received their prizes by mail. The media was alerted and the competition received good coverage around the state.

## LIVING MURAL COMPETITION

This competition, run from September to November 1987, invited Australian school students of any age to submit designs of any size and in any medium which could be translated into flowers and shrubs in the three huge retaining walls on the World Expo 88 site.

The largest retaining wall, to be called the Aussie Mural, required essentially Australian designs. The remaining retaining walls required designs which either highlighted the theme of World Expo 88 'Leisure in the Age of Technology' or the international nature of the exposition.

A prize of a 3-Day ticket to World Expo 88 was offered to any students whose designs were considered good enough to be used (either in whole or in part) for any of the living murals. Over 100 entries were received by the closing date of 30 November, 1987. These entries came from Queensland, New South Wales and Victoria and represented children of all ages.

Exhibit: The Cook Islands present a traditional hut called "Are Karioi" or House of Entertainment. Traditionally, these huts were used by young people to sing and dance at night. The entrance features legendary Gods of the Cook Islands who have played a major part in its mythology. Other significant traditional artifacts such as "eel traps", oversized "peace" fans and staff Gods are featured.

The pavilion also displays some of the tourist attractions of the Islands. Tourism information will be available, highlighting this new attractive South Pacific destination.

Entertainment: Traditional craft skills are on show with impromptu entertainment demonstrating the use of musical instruments in Cook Islands song and dance. Cook Islanders play musical instruments, including ukeleles, and sing. Demonstrations of handicrafts also feature, including the weaving of fine 'rito' hats.

Restaurant: No

<u>Shop</u>: The shop sells national specialities such as "rito" hats, woven fans (made from young coconut fronds and mother-of-pearl shells, shell leis, tangaroa idols, locally produced screen-printed 'pareus' or sarongs, handmade ukeleles, locally-produced perfumes, local coffee in packs and a collection of notes and coin sets and postage stamps. Hours: 10am to 9pm.

## COP (Community Orientation Programme)

The Community Orientation Programme, undertaken by the Communications Division, is an hour-long seminar which explores three basic areas:

- . the importance of the tourism industry and the impact World Expo 88 will make on the tourism industry both during Expo and into the future.
- the importance of professional, courteous service for the many interstate and overseas tourists expected in Queensland both during and after World Expo 88.
- . World Expo 88 itself the international, state and corporate pavilions; the varied entertainment programme and the on-site food, beverage and merchandising outlets and information facilities.

The seminar is conducted by two Presenters using video support.

## Target Audience

The COP targets those people who have direct contact with tourists, ie. taxi, bus, ferry drivers, police, customs officials, airline staff, hotel/motel front desk staff, retail staff etc. It is expected that more than 40,000 people will participate in the programme throughout Queensland and Northern New South Wales.
