Exhibit: The pavilion demonstrates how technological development has created leisure time by reducing working hours. Visitors to the pavilion will learn of the way people in this part of Europe have spent their leisure time since the dawn of history, up to the present age of technology.

Historic artifacts include a sculpture of a human head from 800 BC, discovered in a settlement on the Danube River, and a four-wheel chariot built about 3,500 years ago.

Displays include pleasure craft, beach equipment and winter sports equipment, fishing and hunting outfits, bicycles, motorcycles and mopets. Models of motor cars from Yugoslavia are on show as well as leisure textile products, camping equipment, health foods, musical instruments, jewellery, and home made souvenirs.

Models, drawings and maps are also on show. The theatre screen films showing the natural beauty and contrasts of Yugoslavia's culture and scenery.

Entertainment: Fashion parades, concerts, national folk dances in traditional costumes, art displays and promotions of various kinds will be staged.

Restaurant: A family restaurant, "Dubrovnik", serves national dishes, similar to those of Central Europe and the Northern Mediterranean. The restaurant is fully licensed.

Shop: Hand made national costumes, crystalware, souvenirs and gifts are on sale. All credit cards accepted.

The Yugoslavia Pavilion is located in a building shared with Indonesia and Singapore.
