

By "dialing" the proper blends of electrical sunshine, twilight, moonlight or starlight, and mixing the correct formulas of heating or cooling, occupants can regulate their own climate, scenery, barometric pressure and even the season of the year.

From inside the Home, occupants may look out through sliding glass doors onto clean. In addition to all this — you have DOUBLE USE OF YOUR LAND.


