

WEEK-OLD ATTENDANCE MARK SURPASSED

Just one week after a two-year mark was set for the number of Fairgoers handled on a single day, record crowds visited the Bell System Exhibit and established a new high. On August 23, a total of 52,090 men, women and children entered the pavilion. The count was 524 higher than the record of 51,566, which was set on the previous Monday. A weekly high attendance figure also was set during the period ending August 29, as a total of 325,714 persons clicked through the turnstiles. Daily results were: August 23--52,090; August 24--47,981; August 25--45,471; August 26--40,642; August 27--45,017; August 28--46,893; and August 29--47,620. The number of visitors to the Exhibit is running about 193,400 higher than it did at the same point and 1964.

FOSTER FAMILY DAY CELEBRATED

The Children's Aid Society honored two couples today as its representative foster parents in ceremonies at the Bell System Exhibit. The event highlighted Children's Aid Society-Foster Family Day at the World's Fair. Morgan Dix Wheelock, president of the organization, and Mrs. Edward C. Lord, II, chairman of its Foster Came Committee, presented engraved silver dishes to Joseph and Inez George of White Plains, and Richard and May Andt of Ekmhurst, Queens. More than 250 foster parents and foster children attended the ceremony. The Georges, foster parents for five years, have three children of their own and three foster children—two of them sisters. A 10-year veteran of New York Telephone, Mr. George is a radioman at the Television Operating Center at the Exhibit. The Andts are caring for two foster children in addition to their own daughter.

In a presentation ceremony, Mr. Wheelock declared, "It is most appropriate that we are gathered here today under the auspices of a corporation whose name is syn-onymous with communication. For communication is our greatest need in foster care. Every day there is greater urgency for us to spread the word of the grawing numbers of children who look to us for foster parents." George J. Carmichael, vice president --Public Relations of New York Telephone, who also participated, noted that the Bell System is "pleased to join with the Children's Aid Society in this special recognition of foster families."

Souvenirs were given to the foster children attending the ceremony. The Exhibit men and women wore bright red badges for the occasion, which the Hostesses set off with white flowers.
