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WORLD'S FAIR, May 26 - Any well-seasoned, professional actor knows only too well how they can be upstaged by children. And when a ten-month old youngster makes her debut in such a public spot as the World's Fair, she takes second place to no one.

That's what happened this morning when this youngster, not yet a year old, arrived at the Fair. In less than two minutes she was surrounded by several hundred children, all of them eager to touch or pat the baby's head.

However, in spite of her tender months, this little girl wasn't the type baby which one can put over one's shoulder and burp.

In fact she was a 350-pound Burmese elephant, standing only 38 inches high and less than four feet long, excluding her trunk which seemed to be constantly in her way.

She is the smallest and youngest elephant ever brought into this country and she'll spend the rest of the season at Carousel Park in the Fair's Lake Area.

She was purchased by Greer Marechal, Jr., president of Carousel Park from Chateau Farms, Inc., dealers in theatrical animals, for \$4,000.

The elephant is unusually docile and carries herself with great dignity, and walked beside her new owner without any restraint from the unloading spot to her summer home in the Lake Area.

The little girl, who was immediately dubbed "Cinderellafant" by a teenage youngster, was born in a Burmese jungle and trapped when she was only two months old. She was sold to the Imperial Zoo in Japan from which she was purchased by the animal dealers and flown to this country.

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
